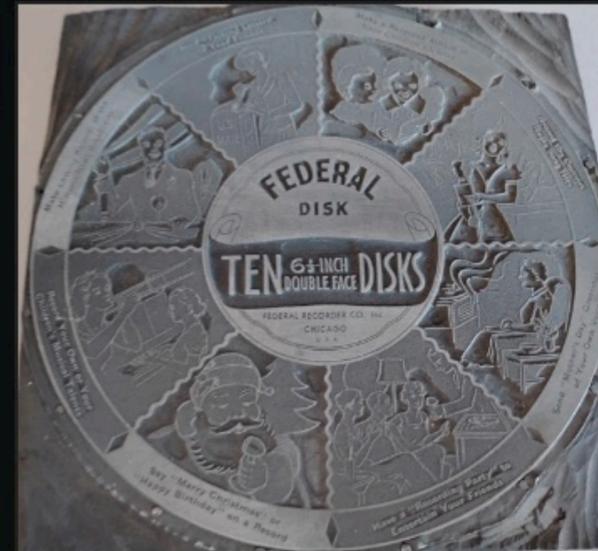

Limited Letterpress: Tools for Not-Enough Text :D

LIMITED LETTERPRESS

For when you only have 1 x A-Z type on hand (or an otherwise limited number of letterpress sorts,) these tools can help you figure out what you can print in one pass.

Coded by [Amanda Wyatt Visconti](#) as they find themselves needing little bits of code to aid printwork; deliberately 90s design.

Synonym Finder

Synonym Finder

Finds synonyms for the word you input, removes any that use any letter more than once, then displays the rest. (Only works with single-word inputs, not phrases.)

Useful if you only have A-Z type, 1 sort per letter, on hand—but want to letterpress print without needing to make multiple passes moving letters around in between and hoping you register things correctly so it looks okay.

Use up some of your remaining letters

Enter the letters/word(s) from your 1xA-Z type you're planning to use, to see which letters of the alphabet are left for other uses. Then paste those letters into a tool like [Unscrambler](#) (choose "all dictionaries") to see possible words you can make from those letters.

Sometimes sellers offer inexpensive sets of characters that don't have all A-Z sorts; I'm particularly thinking of when they offer something like 7-12 letters (e.g. "CCDFLLNOZ" or see example screenshot below from Ebay), for this tool: when you want to know whether one of the words you care about (a "keyword") is spellable, if you buy the set. Thumbs up means it's spellable with your entered letters; thumbs down means you're an awesome person but can't spell the words you entered with those letters.



Version for others to use (you enter what keywords to look for)

ABOUT THE HOME FOR BROKEN WOOD TYPE

I love how wood type carries the story of its human use; broken type is part of that visible story of our printing communities.

IF YOU HAVE PIECES OF BROKEN WOOD TYPE YOU AREN'T USING: *PLEASE EMAIL ME!*

I'll pay for shipping to get these to a good next home in my broken-type collection (and send you a print made from broken wood type if you're interested & I have any left). I'm interested in all kinds of broken wood letterpress type: they **really don't** need to have all the pieces of a whole sort, be an identifiable typeface or character, nor be mendable. Send me your unfathomable type-high wood shards, as well as things broken but closer to original form :) I'll take better photos of them, too—most of the current gallery is from type I didn't have a chance to photo up close before a winter storm closed the studio.

In early 2026, I started *a broadside print project using Penland School of Craft Letterpress Studio's broken wood type*. I then cleaned a case to make a new safe storage home for them that suggests mending, gently printing, and preserving rather than tossing into the dreaded Hell Bucket (Penland's is a whole bucket, not a jar/box; love it). I'll be printing with more broken wood type, including to encourage folks not to discard it. I'll also document the different ways different kinds of wood type has broken (e.g. material, character, typeface, size, ???), and get practice mending and protecting such type when it's in mendable condition.

In case anyone is worried—no type is being deliberately broken! 🙏 I have a background in book history, librarianship, and preservation. Any type that looks at risk of further breakage is **not** being printed with. Printable broken type is treated with extra care—e.g. not overtightening the quoins, attending to what the broken edges are against, etc. My goal is type preservation over print use <3. When a sort's printing time is done, it still has beauty, a story in its fingerprints and dings, and a reminder that much of our cherished letterpress equipment is rapidly aging and no longer replaceable (at least in quite the same way, same history and makers, etc.).

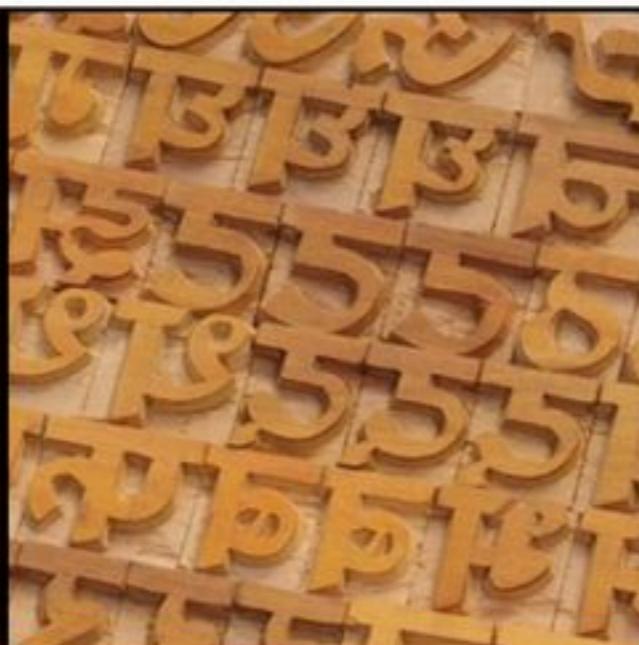

ZINES

Curated by Amanda Wyatt Visconti, Director of the Scholars' Lab

People often picture zines similar to their 20th-century origins as free collaged and xeroxed paper booklets about subcultures, including punk music and the Riot grrrl movement; fandoms, including for mid-century sci fi; social justice and marginalized experiences; or their earliest precursors, especially the Harlem Renaissance's "little magazines." Today, creators make "zines" that vary widely in how they look and what they contain—but most zines stay true to the form's original vision: radically low-barrier authoring, publication, dissemination, and reading.

This exhibit showcases a slice of that variety: zines are less about the visible object and more about a DIY (do-it-yourself) ethos of no-gatekeeping making and sharing art, information, and knowledge. The examples in this case are just a few of the many ways zines can look. Despite their differences, what similarities do you notice?

My favorite thing about zines—and why I think they are important, especially in this moment—is how accessible they can be. Anyone with access to paper and a pen can make a zine and circulate it without dealing with a publisher's gatekeeping. Zines don't need to look good to be effective—there are great zines that are just scrawly penned thoughts on white paper! So many zines are free, in a world where most things (including knowledge!) cost money.

As a librarian, free zines mean I can display authors and topics from our public space amplifying more authors, more experiences, and more topics our community cares about or needs to know than we can with just books—especially where racism, transphobia, and other violence and systematic disenfranchisement make it hard for people to author, publish, and widely share in book form.

As part of the UVA Library's mission to make information accessible to all, zines provide a low- or no-cost way to author and spread knowledge and creativity, which is why we host a public zine distro, plan zine-making workshops and events, and archive campus zines.

BAD ART + retro **TECH**

Technologies aren't only *digital*—they're anything applying knowledge toward practical solutions. The printing press & the telegraph; wheelchairs & glasses; crosswalk paint & pencils are technologies. Taking this broad view of "tech" helps us keep a critical & ethical mindset: who does this help or harm?

The digital humanities, too, is about more than just *digital work*—it embraces experimental approaches to tech and culture. DH no longer uses punch cards or CD-ROMs. Websites won't always be our primary format, either. What holds across time is a critical, creative, & ethical approach to tech—and a radical openness to experimenting with what methods & forms can best help us pursue our research questions.

B.A.R.T. (Bad Art, Retro Tech) is a chill working group exploring what hands-on experiments using retro tech can teach us about the intersection of critical tech & culture.

We're taking a **"bad art"** approach to get there—a willingness to explore creative methods without being "good" at them, to make quick or tiny art, to value personal learning & pleasure in the creative process over the perfection of its product. We hope the framing of "bad art" frees us to enjoy creativity without comparison.

Our final outcome: a collaboratively written, letterpress-printed, poster-size manifesto on creative, critical, experimental approaches to knowledge-building & sharing. Working group participants will all take home a copy.

What can art, craft, & making teach us about critical technology & culture?

We're starting with some pre-digital technologies of text & communication, but are eager for more ideas & methods you suggest we explore.

2026 explorations:

- Jellygraph (hectographic) printing
- Letterpress printing with wood type (tabletop cylinder & screw presses)
- Lofi screenprinting
- Zine making

Additional explorations might include: Geocities-style early 90s web design, letterpress printing with lead type on the big Common Press & a small platen press, mimeograph, spirit duplication/"dittos", pneumatic tube messaging, amateur radio, USB & microcomputer minimal computing, risograph, MUD writing, lino carving, ???

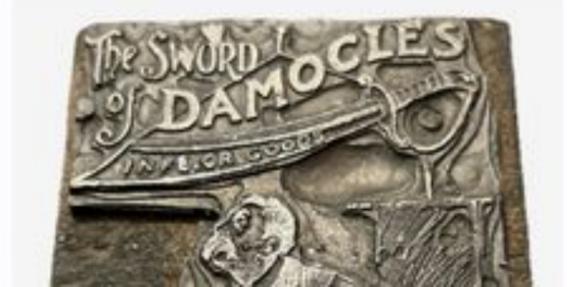
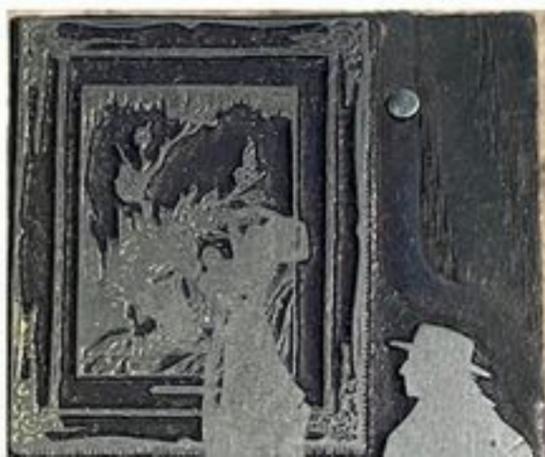

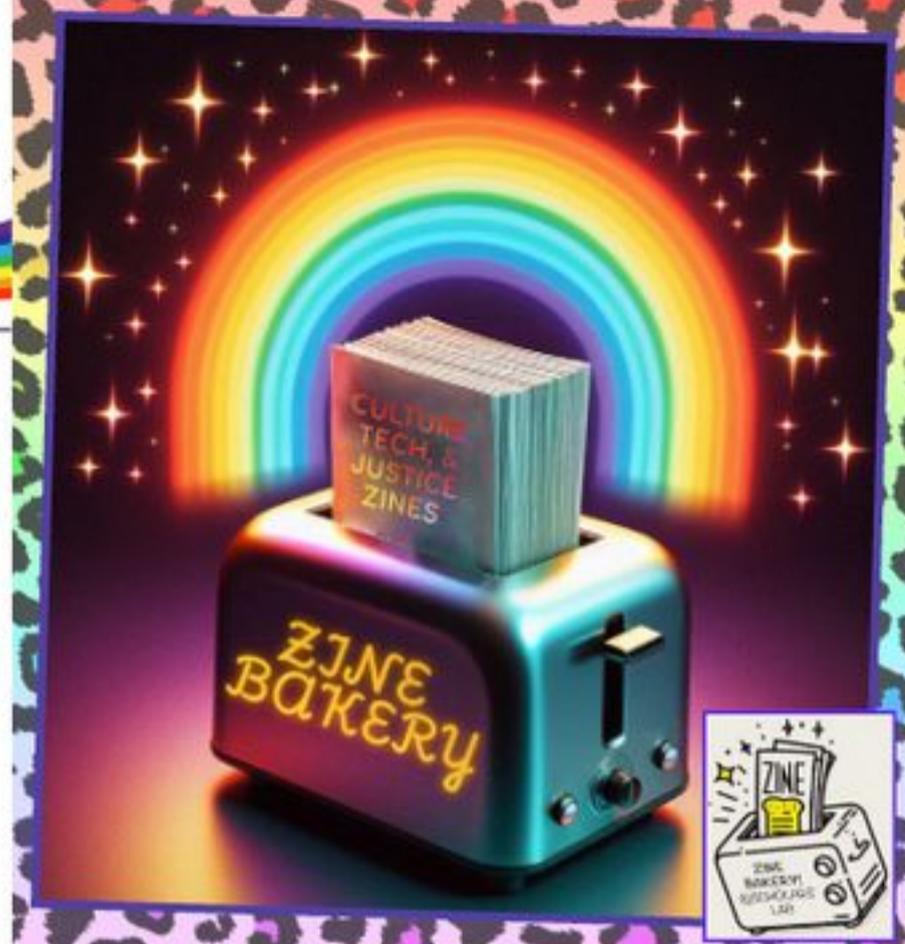
Exploring zines for DH research, methods training, & scholarly communication

You might be picturing zines as their 20th-century origins: collaged, xeroxed, free paper booklets on subcultures, social justice, marginalized experiences; or their earliest precursors, like the "little magazines" of the Harlem Renaissance. But today, creators make "zines" varying widely in format, from 100+ page tiny books to digital-only creative websites. Content varies widely: comics, tutorials, scholarly or personal essays, collage, creative writing, news, & more.

However they look, most zines stay true to the form's original vision of

radically low-barrier
authoring, publication, dissemination, & reading

Zines are a welcoming, inexpensive, and effective format for do-it-yourself scholarly communication, friendly teaching of digital research methods, and public humanities outreach — as well as an opportunity for data analysis and other DH explorations.



The *Zine Bakery* (ZineBakery.com) is a digital humanities project collecting, amplifying, researching, & authoring zines, with an emphasis on free, reshareable zines & zines about culture, tech, & justice.

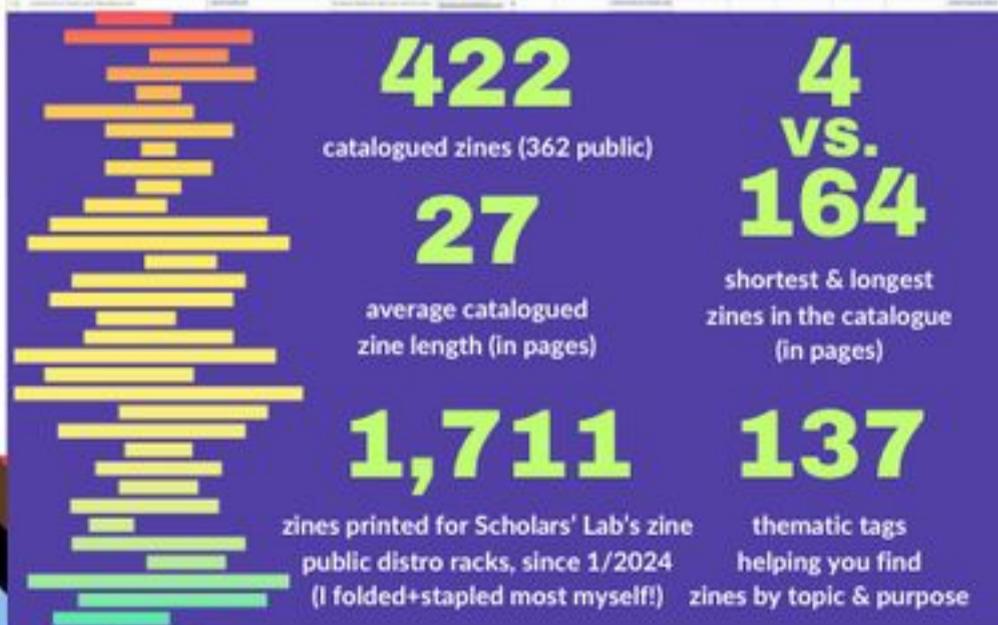

This broadside will eventually include further text, but a harsh winter storm ended the Winter 2026 Penland artist residencies early, so the rest of the print is delayed. It currently contains only text made using broken wood type from Penland, arranged to say "'Broken' is a relative term".

#DHmakes: Baking Craft into DH Discourse

Abstract

This paper traces the history and development of the collaborative #DHmakes initiative to bring crafts into the mainstream of Anglophone digital humanities, starting in 2022 but building upon earlier calls to bridge the maker / craft divide. It argues for the importance of this work within digital humanities as a way of reconnecting technology with its textile roots, while also recognizing the creative and intellectual potential found in feminine-coded craft praxis. The history of different phases within digital humanities is often poorly documented. By recording the development of this recent movement – already a challenge following a mass exodus from Twitter, where much of these conversations initially took place – this paper captures the origins of an important moment in the field, as “digital humanities” was coming to understand itself more capaciously than the “digital” alone would imply.
